### Worship Themes for February 2018

- February 4**      **A Place of Healing.** Based on Isaiah 40:21-31 and Mark 1:29-39, the Scriptural foundation on the work of Jesus and the power of God as relates to healing, raises a challenge to churches: how can we be places of healing? Communion will be served.
- February 11**    **A Place of Light.** Based on 2 Corinthians 4:3-6 and Mark 9:2-9. In times when it seems like the night rises among us, the insights Paul and the gospels have about Jesus being a source of light for our lives seems particularly important. What does it mean for the church to be a place of light, where we see more clearly and are a source of light for the world?
- February 14**    **Ash Wednesday: A time of focus and blessing.** We will celebrate Taize-style with chanting and reflection with optional communion and the imposition of ashes. And it's St. Valentine's Day! What could be more appropriate (we are working on how to fit these two themes together!)
- February 18**    **A Place of Christ's Presence.** Based on 1 Corinthians 12:12-26 and Ephesians 4:1-16, we look at what it means for the church to be the Body of Christ.
- February 25**    **A Place of God's Blessing.** Based on Genesis 12, 1 Corinthians 13 and Matthew 5:13-16, we reflect on the church as being a place where people discover God's blessings. This will be Dr. Montgomery's last Sunday with us!

### Being the Beloved Community - Our Lenten Journey

Our journey together this Lenten season will be different than in the recent past. For one thing, it is a time of heightened excitement and anticipation as we prepare to receive our new settled pastor, Rev. Sarah Lund. On the other hand, it is a time of sadness as we prepare to say goodbye to Rev. Michael. But isn't that how Lent has always been - a time of reflection on what to let go of in order to make room for what will be? Lent can be a solitary journey of self-reflection, but it can also be a journey embarked upon together by the community of faith.

Our theme for 2018 is "Being the Beloved Community" and our programming will explore this theme in various ways. In past years, we have scheduled our Lenten gatherings to be on

Wednesday evenings, preceded by a soup supper. This year our gatherings will be at different times in order that more people will be able to participate in at least some of the gatherings. Please put the following dates and times on your calendar and plan to join in.

**Wednesday Feb 21** "Lessons and Challenges for our Community," presented by Rev. Michael in his signature interactive style. Please join us at 6:15 for a light supper. The program begins at 7:00 p.m.

**Wednesday Feb 28** The Green Team will present on how the Beloved Community cares for God's beloved creation. The leader will be Carol Johnston, CTS Professor Emerita of Theology and Culture. Please join us at 6:15 for a light supper. The program begins at 7:00 p.m.

**Sunday March 4  
1:00-3:00 PM.** A workshop on communication presented by guest speaker Cynthia Drouin. Ms. Drouin graduated from Christian Theological Seminary in 2016 with a Master of Arts in Clinical Mental Health Counseling. She is a Licensed Mental Health Counseling Associate, working towards full licensure. She is skilled at teaching groups of diverse people ways of communicating that help them set and meet their goals while at the same time affirming one another even when compromise is necessary. Ms. Drouin has a history with FCC; she grew up in our church and is the daughter of the beloved Rev. Waldo Savage and Priscilla Savage. Come join us for an afternoon of learning and practicing ways of communicating within the beloved community. If you wish, bring a sick lunch. Refreshments will be served during the break.

**Sunday March 11** The folks from New Creation will present a Lenten program that will help us all deepen our faith through creative and innovative approaches to the scriptures. Come and be prepared to be inspired! Better yet, come an experience New Creation worship service from 5:30 - 6:30; enjoy a light meal from 6:30 - 7:00, and stay for the Lenten program.

### **New Creation Worship**

**February 4** We continue our theme of expressing our devotion to God by looking at how other people's lives have influenced our lives of faith. Who have been our exemplars? Shaped us through their examples. Romans 16.

**February 11** Our final worship service in the season of Epiphany will feature worship in a 'Quaker meeting' style of silence and speaking only when the Spirit says 'Speak!'

**February 18** Lent is a time when Christians prepared for baptism and formally choosing to follow Christ. Which raises the question of other than penance for our sins, what is important to progressive Christians in following Jesus? We begin by asking the basic question: "What's Important about Jesus?"

**February 25** Theme: How do we follow Jesus? By showing compassion for others!

### **Minister's Reflections**

We have now past the half way mark of January and the weather scientists tell us that winter itself is now half over. Part of us doesn't believe that---January is when we realize that it will only get worse in February and we remember that our biggest snow storms usually come in March. But change is like that. ### **Mission of the Month, Indiana Youth Group (IYG)**

Indiana Youth Group (IYG) was founded in 1987 by Franklin College grads and partners Chris Gonzalez and Jeff Werner. Both men volunteered for the Gay and Lesbian Switchboard in Indianapolis and noticed the huge number of calls coming from youth under age 21 with issues of homelessness, suicide and dropout.

For over 30 years the mission of IYG has been to create safe spaces, provide wellness programming and educate LGBTQ youth and the community. The result is self-actualized, competent adults providing leadership and advocacy in our greater community.

With the assistance of grants, donations and fund raising, IYG moved into a newer and larger facility a few weeks ago. The new facility is located at 3733 N. Meridian and will allow IYG to increase its programming.

This year our monetary donations will be used in the following areas:

- SWAP Closet- IYG youth can obtain appropriate clothing for job interviews, school, or other life situations. IYG is also accepting donations of gently used clothing for these purposes.
- Food Pantry – Each day that IYG is open meals provided by volunteer organizations are served to the youth. Often times this meal is the only food some of the youth have that day. The Pantry is available to provide nourishing food to youth for those days when the Center is closed.
- In late summer 2018, IYG and Trinity Episcopal Church will be opening Trinity House, an LGBTQ homeless shelter which will have space for 14 youth. Our donations will help furnish this facility to provide safe housing for youth who have been outcast from their families because they are LGBTQ.

Our generous support will help make a better present for the young people in our community. Within the last decade there has been a national project titled "It Gets Better" to give hope to LGBTQ individuals. It can be better, today with our assistance.

In all situations, Fidelity (our broker) is instructed to sell the stock when transfer is complete and then to move the money to our cash portion of the account. ### 2017 Operating Results vs. Budget

#### Highlights:

- Contributions were on budget.
- Expenses were \$12,000 below budget and almost \$10,000 below last year!
- We began the year with a \$14,000 deficit in our operating budget. Thanks to great expense management and strong December contributions, we ended the year with a deficit of only \$2,409 – 1% of our operating budget.
