Worship Themes for October 2017

- October 1 World Wide Communion Sunday. At a time when the divisions of the world loom large, we will re-imagine unity on World Wide Communion Sunday. So often our statements of unity are either so altruistic as to have no connection with reality; this service seeks to be grounded in our connections with Christians in the Caribbean nations. Philippians 2:1-13, Luke 14:15-22
- October 8 Abject Bodies and the Jesus Movement. Many of us have bodies that aren't 'right' for the standards of this day: we are too old, too this, too that.

 Bartimaeus was all of the above, and found healing with Jesus. Mark 10:46-52.
- October 15 The Greatest Commandment! There is a description of liberal Christians, somewhat pejorative, that we are 'Golden Rule Christians', content with merely loving our neighbors and not wrestling with the really demanding Scriptures. But Jesus seems to hold loving God and loving your neighbor. They are, for him, one law. He might be onto something (ya think?)! Matthew 22:34-40.
- October 22 Basic Truths. Give to Caesar what is Caesar's, Give to God what is God's, says Jesus. But which is which? To tell the truth, we are building the foundation for this year's stewardship campaign, which is gratitude for God's work and love. Matthew 22:15-22.
- October 29 500th Anniversary of the Reformation: **A continuing Reformation.** Admittedly, the story of Luther's pounding his 95 Theses for theological debate is not a direct part of our heritage, but it did launch a general reformation of western Christianity that continues to this day. We continue the work of reformation both with ourselves and with our society. Romans 1:16-17.

Pastor's Reflection

By the end of October we will have celebrated our talent (or lack thereof) in our 'FCC's Got Talent' celebration, had our CROP Walk, hosted Family Promise for a week, started our spiritual reflections on how we are grateful for God's gifts and work, begun work in the Adult Sunday School class on violence and justice, a process that will lead us, perhaps, for consideration of a formal 'Just Peace Church' designation, and prayed for our search committee as they make the gradual shift from reading profiles to interviewing candidates to going and listening to people preach at another, 'neutral' site.

At the end of the month there is the old celebration of Reformation Sunday. Red stoles and ties will abound, we will sing 'A Mighty Fortress is Our God' and we will wonder a bit why we are celebrating a German beginning of the Reformation back in the early 16th Century. Why do this? Well, in part because we are the grandchildren of that movement to reform church

and society. Reform movements broke out in Italy, Bohemia, Poland, France, Switzerland, England, Scotland, the Netherlands and Germany. Some lost, some won, and here we are. But more importantly, we continue the work of reformation when we struggle with inclusive language to bend our lives towards gender justice, examine difficult issues on violence and justice and do the work listed above in the first paragraph.

The reformation continues. The church, as H. Richard Niebuhr put it, is in a continual reformation, a continual revolution in the world, working always towards God's justice, God's love, God's realm. Amen!

Sunday Adult Classes

All classes meet in the Library (room 212) at 9:45 a.m. All are welcome!

The adult class on Sunday mornings (9:45) will continue to interpret Jesus' life for us. The theme for October will be violence and peace.

Violence and peace: in the Bible, in faith traditions, in our society and in our church. Before you get lost in the forest because of all of these trees, let us assure you the issues we propose raising will stimulate our thinking about what each of us can do about combatting violence and promoting peace.

We will begin looking at violence in three faith traditions and what our scriptures say about violence. Then we will touch on different forms of violence: hoarding, speech, touching, and oppression before we look at hope in the midst of violence.

Finally, the class will study the concept of "shalom" through another Kerygma study. This will last several weeks, and carry us into Advent. On Thanksgiving Sunday, Carol will bring us a refreshing look at the Pilgrims. Welcome to any and all who would like to join us for these current issues.

October 1: "Violence in the Scriptures of the Three Abrahamic Religious Traditions" - This cursory review will help us see that across the world violence has been a part of the world's religions, and even condoned under many circumstances.

October 8: "Violence Wears Many Disguises" - This session will focus on the many kinds of violence in our world, society, and even in the church. From our discussion, we hope to discover what kinds of violence concern our class members and adjust future sessions accordingly.

October 15: "Violence of the Tongue" – This discussion will incorporate a recent article by Paul Krugman on "Contempt." Where do we hear violent speech and what are our responses?

October 22: "The Violence of Hoarding" - Income inequality both here in our country and across the world is a major violence to the poor. We will discuss the ramifications of this in many violent situations.

October 29: "The Violence of Oppression" - In many countries and in our own, there are groups that are being oppressed, either outright or subtly. Many countries are divided into tribes, parties or various segments of society, with those in power legislating rules to keep others "in their place." The tremendous number of displaced people across the world is a result. What are causes and what can be done?

New Creation Worship

New Creation worship is a jazz based worship experience that weaves together prayer and an interactive interaction with the Bible, usually but not always on the same themes as the morning worship service. Think of it as a house church with a really good band. Come join us!

Increased Logging in our State Forests

Over the past 12 years, the Indiana Division of Forestry has gradually increased the commercial logging in our state forests by 400%. This has been done in part to supplement their operating budget, which has been cut. Now the DOF plans to log about 300 acres in the **backcountry area** [BCA] of Morgan Monroe and Yellowwood State Forests, an area that was set aside in 1981 to provide a wilderness experience for those who seek nature and solitude in their outdoor adventures. This action is extremely upsetting to environmentalists and others. There are trees in the tract 130 to 160 years old. Biologist surveys have found that 21 endangered species live in this forest, including the Indiana bat, timber rattlesnake, and worm-eating warbler. This entire BCA comprises just 1.7% of the total Indiana state forest lands. Couldn't this tiny percent be allowed to remain unlogged? The plan is to log 23%, almost one-fourth, of the standing tree volume in half of these BCA acres. Two popular trails, the Tecumseh Trail and the Possum Trot Trail, will be closed for 3 years to facilitate logging. The operation will leave many damaged trees, eroded ground on steep slopes, stumps, other debris, and gravel roads which will be visible for many years.

Overall, we are positive to our budget. Income is \$1,325 below budget due to a continued shortfall in non-pledge contributions. Expenses are \$9,800 below the budget. The expense trends are similar to what we saw for the first 7 months:

- Admin & Operations \$3,900 below budget Most of this is true savings.
- Outreach & Service \$4,800 below budget a matter of timing, as most of our mission contributions are made later in the year.
- House & Grounds \$635 above budget mostly attributable to natural gas.

We've made up a fair amount of the \$14,000 deficit that was built into our 2017 budget, but there's still work to do to end the year in the black. Thanks to everyone for your continued generous giving and careful expense management.

October 1 Nicaragua meeting

On Sunday, October 1 we will have an open meeting after the 11 a.m. worship service to discuss work camps and mission trips. We have on the horizon a possible trip to Nicaragua in either January or February, 2018. But while our friends in Nicaragua always have room for us, at this time this is our need more than it is theirs. We have funds that have been designated for support of Nicaraguan ministries, that cannot be changed. But our time and resources might also be better put to use in disaster clean up in Texas, Florida or the Caribbean or a peace and justice tour of the Holy Land. What does God call us to do? This meeting will explore possibilities.

Bread for the World - update

In this year of proposed deep budget cuts, we wrote letters to encourage lawmakers to maintain programs that help hungry people locally and worldwide. The bipartisan appropriations bill recently passed for the remainder of fiscal year 2017 provides \$1 billion for famine relief and protects programs that help hungry people in the United States and developing countries such as WIC and international maternal and child nutrition programs. Much appreciation goes to the negotiators, the bipartisan legislative supporters of this effort and the 3,630 letters from 42 congregations in central Indiana!

Church Women United (CWU)

Members of our church have been long supporters of Church Women United – including Ceil Larson, Nancy Dickinson and others. Our church is also now a member. CWU is a national Christian women's group that has a strong local chapter whose current president is Mary Boggs. The members are from diverse denominations such as AME (African Methodist Episcopal), Baptist, Friends, Mennonite, Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, Methodist, UCC, and others. CWU has the following purpose: To encourage Christian women to come together in a visible community to witness to their faith in Jesus Christ and enabled by the Holy Spirit, believing we are one in the Spirit, to go out together into every neighborhood and nation in search of a common ground, as instruments of reconciling love. Common ground has been found in the current four national priorities – Childhood education; Childhood hunger alleviation; Women's Health; Racial, Ethnic Equality and Cultural Inclusion. There are about 10 meetings/programs per year, some are nationally focused and some are local – I am especially appreciative of the opportunities to build relationships across the city and join with diverse churches. Becoming a Nature Explore Classroom Ginny Hacker, Director Meridian Hills Cooperative Nursery School & Kindergarten

The Nature Explore Classroom is a collaborative program of the National Arbor Foundation and Dimensions Educational Research Foundation. Well over a year in the planning, we are proud to be the first school in Indianapolis to receive this designation. More can be found at https://natureexplore.org/ The 10 required areas for certification are noted in italics.

Without the support of our host, the First Congregational Church UCC, becoming a Nature Explore Classroom would not have been possible and we are very grateful.

In this era when two year olds know how to swipe on a phone and an iPad is at the end of little arms magnetizing eyes to focus, I feel that it is our job to connect children to each other and the natural world around them.

The REIMAGINED Playground includes:

- A newly established raised garden area called The Sensory Garden,
- All new native perennial plants and flowers in multiple garden areas,
- The Creek, built to control erosion down the hillside
- A Nature Art Area
- An entry area designed by The Willow Man to serve as a one-of-a-kind arbor surrounding
- Established buildings and play equipment, some built by FCC member Carl Rothe
- A commemorative MHCNS&K 50th Anniversary Brick Pathway

To make this entire idea come together, we planned a fundraising effort to honor a beloved former teacher and director and dedicated our 'Reimagined Playground' to Shari Robinson, who passed away in the fall of 2015. Shari was a nature and art lover and after retiring in 2000 after teaching for 25 years, she remained involved with the school by inviting classes to her home for fall nature scavenger hunts and to make cider from her vintage cider press. As a watercolor artist, she returned annually to visit classes to lead individual and class still life projects. We raised an historic amount, nearly doubling the original goal. Families donated in

Shari's honor to fund the dry creek bed, build a new entry arbor, build garden boxes and establish butterfly and sensory gardens, and restore her cider press with much gratitude to **FCC member and chair of the board of trustees**, **Glenn Evans**, for his work on that restoration.

The additional summer workdays were well-attended and included a long-time friend of Shari and her two daughters and one granddaughter who came to weed, dig and transplant alongside the current staff and parents. Plants from Shari's home now sit in the new Directors' Corner Garden, situated between the school entrance and the welcome entry to the playground. In the history of 57 years of the school, there have only been three (3) to serve as directors, two past (Dessie Partenheimer Koch and Shari Robinson) and one current, Ginny Hacker. All three women were co-op parents, teachers and directors at this school and plants from the other two women's homes join Shari's.

A dedication of our new Nature Explore Classroom will take place on September 23, 2017 at the annual Fall Picnic. Current families, staff, alumni donors and friends of the school will come together, drink apple cider from her press and celebrate our newly renovated space honoring the legacy of Shari Robinson. A commemorative limestone marker at the toe of the gate marks the dedication of the REIMAGINED Playground.
