
## **Today's Scripture**

### Luke 24:13-35

<sup>13</sup> That same day, two of the disciples were making their way to a village called Emmaus—which was about seven miles from Jerusalem—<sup>14</sup> discussing all that had happened as they went. <sup>15</sup> While they were discussing these things, Jesus approached and began to walk along with them, <sup>16</sup> though they were kept from recognizing Jesus, <sup>17</sup> who asked them, "What are you two discussing as you go your way?" They stopped and looked sad. 18 One of them, Cleopas by name, asked him, "Are you the only one visiting Jerusalem who doesn't know the things that have happened these past few days?" <sup>19</sup> Jesus said to them, "What things?" They said, "About Jesus of Nazareth, a prophet powerful in word and deed in the eyes of God and all the people—<sup>20</sup> how our chief priests and leaders delivered him up to be condemned to death and crucified him. <sup>21</sup> We were hoping that he was the one who would set Israel free. Besides all this, today—the third day since these things happened—<sup>22</sup> some women of our group have just brought us some astonishing news. They were at the tomb before dawn <sup>23</sup> and didn't find the body; they returned and informed us that they had seen a vision of angels, who declared that Jesus was alive. <sup>24</sup> Some of our number went to the tomb and found it to be just as the women said, but they didn't find Jesus." <sup>25</sup> Then Jesus said to them, "What little sense you have! How slow you are to believe all that the prophets have announced! <sup>26</sup> Didn't the messiah have to undergo all this to enter into glory?" <sup>27</sup> Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, Jesus interpreted for them every passage of scripture which referred to the messiah. <sup>28</sup> By now they were near the village they were going to, and Jesus appeared to be going

further. <sup>29</sup> but they said eagerly, "Stay with us. It's nearly evening—the day is practically over." So the savior went in and stayed with them. <sup>30</sup> After sitting down with them to eat, Jesus took bread, said the blessing, then broke the bread and began to distribute it to them. <sup>31</sup> With that their eyes were opened and they recognized Jesus, who immediately vanished from their sight. <sup>32</sup> They said to one another, "Weren't our hearts burning inside us as this one talked to us on the road and explained the scriptures to us?" <sup>33</sup> They got up immediately and returned to Jerusalem, where they found the eleven and the rest of the company assembled. <sup>34</sup> They were greeted with, "Christ has risen! It's true! Jesus has appeared to Simon!" 35 Then the travelers recounted what had happened on the road, and how they had come to know Jesus in the breaking of the bread.
