Pastor's Reflections

The luckiest summer of my life was my junior year in college when I lived at the Grand Canyon National Park on the North Rim. My roommate was a park ranger and we shared a cabin nestled right along the gorgeous wooded landscape of the North Rim. My job that summer was to work at the front desk of the North Rim Lodge checking international tourists into their cabins and motel rooms. But that's not why I was there. I was there as a volunteer with A Christian Ministry in the National Parks. Every week I helped lead worship in the assembly hall of the historic North Rim Lodge and also out in the campgrounds. Worshipping outside surrounded by nature is a special experience and that summer I took full advantage of enjoying the beauty of Creation.

This month we will have our own experience at First Congregational of outdoor worship during the week. Imagine a 30 minute, simple outdoors vespers service. Following safety protocols, we will gather outside for 30 minutes of worship so that we can connect with each other in-person. Our first outdoor vespers worship service will be Tuesday, July 14 from 7:00-7:30pm and also on Tuesday, July 28 from 7:00-



7:30pm. Right now we are imagining this taking place around our Memorial Garden, yet final details will be provided in the weekly Epistles and in the Sunday bulletins. There's a lot to think about: safe physical distancing, sound system, bring your own chairs, and hoping for good weather. We will take it one day at a time and figure it out together. I know that some of our members will not be able to join us in-person and we will miss you. We will spend part of our time in prayer together, and we will be praying for each one of you.

I'm finding that during a global pandemic, the details of what it means to Be The Church changes, and that is okay. Yet, some key elements remain the same: to Be The Church means to keep an open mind, keep trying new things, keep experimenting, and most of all, keep our covenant of love for one another.

When we gather for our first Tuesday evening brief vesper worship service outside on July 14, I know I'll be thinking of my Grand Canyon days. I know that it will be good to be together at the church. I know that God is with us now, and will be with us tomorrow. No matter what, know that you are not alone and that God loves you.

I'm blessed to have a home that is a safe and comfortable refuge, a spouse who is healthy and attentive, a supportive church family, and a loving God who watches over me. What more might I truly need?

Especially when we now have some opportunities (however brief) to be in company with one another on FC's grounds! A few days ago I greatly enjoyed the socially-distanced gathering at FC to resume our important food pantry ministry, and I look forward to future opportunities for similar experiences. A huge "Thank you!" goes to the folks who made the time and space for gathering possible! A week earlier we demonstrated our commitment to moving forward by receiving new members virtually. These small steps toward expanding our faith community and pursuing our ministries show that we can and will continue to "Be The Church", regardless of coronavirus adaptations.

I've learned that the best antidotes to discouragement and depression are gratitude and service. So I try to recognize my blessings and look for ways to be of help to others worse off than I. In the midst of this pandemic we are presented with opportunities to join our voices with those pleading for equality – specifically at this time, our siblings of color. Might we consider taking some beginning steps toward an intentional racial justice ministry? Faith In Indiana is seeking our partnership; perhaps now is the time to answer that call? I invite conversation around these questions. Coronavirus or not, the world needs us to "Be The Church", perhaps now more than ever. With God's help, we will continue to figure it out.

From the Comeback Team

First Congregational UCC has been closed to in-person gatherings since 3/12/20, and it is currently closed through the end of July. Worship services have been held virtually, with many positive steps made to widen the ability of our congregation to participate. We have been using Zoom for church meetings and gatherings, but not everyone can use it. Even for those using Zoom, we are missing an integral element of "being church" – the ability to personally see and interact with one another, if even briefly. This is especially missed as other elements of our society are participating in "re-opening".

Up to now, the Comeback Team has primarily been focusing on protocols for future inperson worship. We are hearing more and more how people have enjoyed brief, often by chance, in-person 'contacts', while maintaining physical distancing. Recognizing the benefit of these occasions, the Comeback Team proposed to the Church Council to change our agreement of being closed to ALL in-person church activities through the end of July; the Council approved the change on June 10th to be:

As of June 20 through the end of July, First Congregational UCC is closed to all in-person gatherings of more than 10 people at one time. However, gatherings of 10 or less may occur outside, and not in the building. Protocols for these gatherings include:

- 1. Must be scheduled with Pastor Sarah, Shannon Abbott (Admin), and Wendy Baldwin (Bldg Mgr); groups may use any area of the church grounds (such as the patio, parking lot, Memorial Garden) where surface contact is minimized (not the playground for now)
- 2. Before the gathering, the group leader will receive the protocols to be observed, and make sure attendees are aware of these; the group leader is responsible that the protocols are followed
- 3. After the gathering, the group leader must send info about who attended to Pastor Sarah and Wendy Baldwin, for contact tracking purposes
- 4. Limit of 10 people at a time
- 5. A distance of 6 feet shall be observed between people of different households; no physical contact shall occur
- 6. Face masks are encouraged
- 7. People who do not feel well should not attend
- 8. People should bring their own beverage/water bottle (do not use the church drinking fountains, water, ice, etc)
- 9. People should bring their own chair
- 10. Church restrooms should only be used for emergencies, and one will be required to sanitize after its use
- 11. If entering the building, people are required to sanitize their hands, and disinfect any surfaces where there is contact of more than 3 minutes; use of face masks are highly encouraged.

Sunday worship will continue to be held virtually through the end of July. The Comeback Team will continue to evaluate and make future recommendations.

Highlights – year to date:

- Income of \$93,000 compares with budget of \$111,600 but \$10,000 of the shortfall is timing we budgeted a \$10,000 draw from the FCC Foundation that we didn't need thanks to our Payroll Protection Program (PPP) loan from the Small Business Administration. So our real shortfall is \$8,600. Pledge income is \$5,200 below budget and non-pledge income is \$3,400 below budget.
- Expenses of \$108,400 were \$1,400 below budget, with most of the savings coming from Pastoral Leadership and Worship and Faith.
- Cash: our cash position was strong at May 31 (over \$52,000) thanks to the \$34,450 PPP loan we received in May.
- **PPP Loan**: Our Payroll Protection Plan loan of \$34,450 is allowing us to maintain our employees on full pay through June, despite our income shortfall and despite reduced activity at the church, without being required to draw funds from the Foundation. After June we will be able to submit paperwork allowing us to convert the loan to a grant.

As a Bird Sings

"Let us consider one another to provoke unto love and to good works: not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is; but exhorting one another" (Hebrews 10:24-25 KJV).

On May 6, 2020, i typed these sentences into Indianapolis Public Library's online Ask-a-Librarian feature: "As a grateful user of your Wayne branch library until it closed for remodeling last December, i await, with bated breath, to find out if its construction has continued after the coronavirus closed all of your branches. Do you have an update? Thank you. Also, i want to express gratitude to the very friendly and helpful Eagle Branch staff and

patrons who treated us regular Wayne branch frequenters ever-so-kindly from December on until all the libraries had to close in February.

"P.S. This morning, when i picked up my library card to type in its Card Number above, it told me it is sad, lonely, and disappointed because it misses how i often used to convey it to the Wayne Branch and then to the Eagle Branch, when i could no longer take it to Wayne. My card said it's eager for me to return to my frequently using it again for the purpose of borrowing library items rather than its just sitting around in its gloomy state. Thank you, kind Librarian."

Within an hour and a half, a librarian replied: "Hello, renovations have continued there and at other branches and we have not heard of any delays on our end. But we have no exact date for the reopening. Hopefully soon."

Both my library card and i were much encouraged by the reply. Moreover, as of June 22, all Indy Public Library branches, including Wayne, have re-opened, with appropriate safety measures, including curb-side pickup of library materials if patrons desire. Both my library card and i are smiling and cheering!

Surely my hearing my library card speak shows how important libraries have been to me—including during a global pandemic. By clicking here

My outlook is reinforced by a suggestion i made to my sons about some information about myself—perhaps for their future use: "Rob and Mike, in case you want a quote for my memorial service, you might consider this, from Susan Orlean's The Library Book. As you well know, her description is the way i have lived much of my life:

"A librarian's single greatest responsibility, according to Althea Warren, 'was to read voraciously. [...] She wanted librarians to simply adore the act of reading for its own sake.... As she said in a speech, librarians should read [...] as a cat sleeps or as a bird sings or a dog responds to an invitation to go walk. Not from conscious training but from they'd rather do it more than anything else in the whole world (The Library Book, 2018)."

- "Mom, were you ever even remotely cool?" Said my 12-year-old son while I did a song and dance about a duck with my 9-year-old son.

When I ask myself the question of why I want to pursue ordination, five key points come to mind: To have greater comfort and clarity in performing and leading the sacraments, to gain more tools in human accompaniment, to continue increasing visibility in being a queer female pastoral leader, to heed the truth that the wholeness of contemplative life must include outward action, and to lead in justice and liberation oriented spirituality. I could not imagine nor envision a better space to do this in than the UCC. My ministry orient is a combination of three movements: movements towards individual wholeness (inner work to utter action), movement towards inclusivity (constantly and consistently expanding the table), and movement towards unity. However, one of the most important reasons why I'm pursuing ordination is that I am the proud auntie of four wonderful guys who each and every day teach me the power of wonder, the importance of awe, and that we really can create a better world.


A bit more about my work is that I've been published in the Convivium Journal, The Thomas Merton Seasonal, The Thomas Merton Annual (Vol. 32), The Huffington Post, Patheos, and the National Catholic Reporter. In 2012, while working as a counselor and reading Thomas Merton's New Seeds of Contemplation, I made a pilgrimage to all seventeen Trappist/Cistercian monasteries in the United States. While there, I wrote, interviewed monks and nuns, and photographed my entire experience within these sacred spaces. Then, in 2013, I moved to Los Angeles to work on the production team of the documentary feature film In Pursuit of Silence. The film's success on the festival circuit and beyond led to its worldwide theatrical release. My most recent project and directorial debut short-film, Day of a Stranger, paints an intimate portrait of Thomas Merton's hermitage years using audio he recorded there, and I hope to release it this summer. My podcast, Encountering Silence, cohosted by Carl McColman, Kevin Johnson, and myself, features interviews with contemplatives, modern-day mystics, and explores the ambiguity of silence in our modern-day lives. Some guests have included Kathleen Norris, Rev. Dr. Sarah Lund (forthcoming

episode), Parker Palmer, Richard Rohr, Dr. Barbara Holmes, peace-activist Jim Forest, Jim Finley, Mirabai Starr, and many more.

When I consider the broad strokes of what I envision my ministry looking like I've thought of a number of ways that continue to host my ministry orients alongside the acceptance of our ever-changing and ever-moving world. Because of this, I hope my ministry always has room to be creative, evolving, and yet also true to the crux of love, our common humanity, and our innate belonging—to ourselves, to each other, and to our God. If any part of this led you to think of me in some small way, please know I would be blessed and honored to carry your prayers along with me in this journey of discernment. If I've learned anything in the realm of spirituality, it is that we need each other, we belong to each other, and we cannot do it alone. Thank you.
