Comeback Team: Current Building Policy

The church building is closed to in-person church gatherings <u>until the following</u> <u>parameters are reached, based on guidance from Dr Virginia Caine, Marion</u>
County Public Health Director:

A 7-day average of 5% (or less) positivity among unique individuals tested for a two-week period, and new cases per day at 35 or under in Marion County, per the metrics shown on www.coronavirus.in.gov.

Special Congregational Meeting: Sunday, March 7th at 12:30 p.m.

It was brought up at the Board Workshop on February 6 and was more recently approved by the Church Council as a recommendation for a congregational vote and approval of next steps. I am eager to hear your thoughts about it, along with any questions you may have. Thank you for your consideration, and I look forward to seeing you soon!

Leadership Proposal

For many years, First Congregational UCC has struggled to fill the Vice Moderator position. This position provides backup to the Moderator in the first year, and typically becomes the Moderator the following year for its one-year term. People are concerned about the 2 year commitment of the Vice Moderator/ Moderator positions, the perceived individual responsibility, and the time required for these positions. For people that are fairly new to our church's governance processes, it is unknown for them - and also for the church - about whether they have the gifts, talents, and the call for the Vice Moderator/Moderator positions.

Another problem is that some very capable people are already serving the church in other leadership roles. By moving to Vice Moderator/Moderator, it can create other leadership gaps.

Is it time to rethink this leadership model? Reflecting the call to "Be the Church" by using holy imagination and holy experiment, let's consider the functions of these positions and how they could be handled in a way that allows members to be willing to participate and serve. To discern next steps, let us approach this in an open and transparent way to trust our process, and one another, during a potential time of change for a long established governance model.

At the Church Council meeting on 2/10/21, the Council approved for recommendation to the congregation the following proposal:

First Congregational UCC shall suspend the parts of its Constitution and Bylaws (CBL) regarding the Vice Moderator and Moderator positions in order to explore the following shared leadership model. This suspension shall be reviewed by the Church Council in December 2021, for further recommendations to the congregation at the Annual Meeting in January 2022. Dependent on that review, it is anticipated to continue the suspension and shared leadership model in 2022, with another review by the Church Council in December 2022, to determine if formal amendments for the CBL shall be presented to the congregation at the Annual Meeting in January 2023.

The shared leadership model is:

- 1. The Moderator/Vice Moderator positions are replaced by a "Senior Council" of "senior councilors", comprised of 3-4 members.
- 2. The senior councilors will meet regularly with the minister.
- 3. The senior councilors will alternate as the "lead councilor" for a quarter, providing a primary contact person, as well as the designated person to conduct Church Council meetings.
- 4. Attendance at various board, committee, and team meetings will be allocated to individual senior councilors in order to share the time commitment.
- 5. Each year, at least 1 new person will be added to the Senior Council, with at least 1 person leaving.
- 6. A person can serve on the Senior Council for a maximum of 5 consecutive years.
- 7. All senior councilors shall attend Church Council meetings, with voice. Only the lead councilor will have voice and vote; other councilors may have voice and vote if they are attending the council in a different role (ie a board representative). If a lead councilor is also a board rep, it is recommended that that board be represented by another person.
- 8. The senior councilors shall be nominated through the normal annual slate process.
- 9. Regarding any legal roles of a Moderator (ie signing papers on behalf of the congregation), these shall be assigned to the lead councilor; a "schedule" designating who is the lead councilor will be approved at a Church Council meeting, and written into the minutes.

Criteria & Expectations for Senior Councilors:

- 1. A senior councilor must be a member (full or Associate) of First Congregational.
- 2. A senior councilor can also serve on a board, and be its chair.
- 3. A senior councilor can also be an officer.
- 4. A senior councilor cannot also serve in a staff position.
- 5. A senior councilor is involved in the life and ministries of the church.
- 6. Desire a mix of people with past leadership experience at First Congregational and those with limited/no experience
- 7. Ability to work collegially while providing input
- 8. Willingness to organize and lead meetings
- 9. Ability to participate in Council meetings, regular Senior Council meetings, and other meetings of the church

The benefits of this proposal are:

- 1. Less daunting to prospects
- 2. Shared learning and responsibility
- 3. Provides leadership training and experience without the full responsibility
- 4. Provides a more collegial and supportive model for lay leadership
- 5. Honors diversity and is more inclusive
- 6. Provides greater continuity in leadership flow
- 7. Provides greater flexibility in resourcing leadership

The risks are:

- 1. Stronger personalities may overwhelm others
- 2. Could develop into 1 main leader with several "vice moderators"
- 3. It's an unknown leadership model for us, although it is commonly used in the Quaker tradition
- 4. Possibility of conflict of interest by a senior councilor serving multiple roles

As we continue our Just Peace Covenant Outreach through the spring (see descriptions of Family Promise https://familypromise.org and Exodus https://www.exodusrefugee.org elsewhere in this newsletter), we want to additionally highlight our annual UCC special offering of One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS). This year we have set aside some budgeted funds to contribute to our UCC special offerings, but we invite individual contributions to supplement our donations to this important global ministry.

From the UCC website:

"One Great Hour of Sharing, part of Our Church's Wider Mission, is the special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that carries God's message of love and hope to people in crisis. The UCC works with international partners to provide sources of clean water, food, education and health care, small business micro-credit, advocacy and resettlement for refugees and displaced persons, and emergency relief and rehabilitation. One Great Hour of Sharing also supports domestic and international ministries for disaster preparedness and response. Sixty percent of the UCC's offering supports international development initiatives, including annual support for missionaries. Currently, there are two One Great Hour of Sharing supported missionaries and one Global Mission Intern working in disaster relief, health care, education, sustainable agricultural development, and refugee support. The offering also funds disaster preparedness and response, and disaster-related volunteer initiatives in the U.S."

Donations to OGHS should be identified separately from donations to Covenant Outreach, which are currently supporting Family Promise, Peace Learning Center, Exodus, and Faith In Indiana. As always, FCC's generosity is greatly appreciated.

Covenant Outreach: Family Promise of Greater Indianapolis

Family Promise is partnership of congregations and community organizations that serves the homeless families of greater Indianapolis. In 1993 a woman named Karen Olson came to the Indianapolis area to give a talk. She had started the first Interfaith Hospitality Network (IHN) in Summit, New Jersey. Only about a dozen people attended her talk that evening, but one man, Dr Dean Linsey, a doctor who had just retired, and was discerning what to focus his life on next, took it to heart. He spoke with Karen after the meeting and over a period of time and some community research it became clear to him what he needed to do was to form an interfaith outreach group. At this time he met Pastor Brian Byrne from St. Peter's United Church of Christ and others and started the The Northside Indianapolis Interfaith Hospitality Network. Later the North Side was dropped from their name. On October 3,1994 the first family was served at Carmel UMC. The IHN grew to include over 35 churches and 1500 volunteers serving homeless families of Indianapolis. In 2013 they expanded their services to include the Aftercare Program and changed their name to Family Promise to reflect their additional outreach to families.

For the past 25 years we have been working alongside of Family Promise to eliminate homelessness in Indianapolis by providing temporary housing for whole families. Typical homeless shelters do not. We all know how critical it is to keep children together with

both parents especially in the developmental years. From the beginning our church has been one of the hosting congregations, and Family Promise has been held up as one of our Missions of the Month for many years. Our 2020 annual report shows we gave generously to this worthy organization. And we invite your continued generosity this year through our Covenant Outreach.

As we are exploring ways to advocate along with our monetary giving, I noticed the following opportunities. Their Interfaith Hospitality Network offers the chance to join with the team from another church that is hosting a family. Duties would include set-up beds, cook meals, drive vans, stay overnight, wash sheets, plan children's activities, and more. If you might be interested you can e-mail Mike at mike@fpgi.org.

Another opportunity where they need volunteers is at their Day center. Here you would have the opportunity to answer the phone from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. weekdays, do occasional maintenance, or even adopt-a-room to decorate on a service day! Highlights:

Our finances are off to an OK start in 2021:

- Our January income is negative \$2,600, but that's because we had to roll over our 2020 deficit of \$21,300. We actually took in \$18,700, which was below budget but not a cause for concern after only one month.
- Expenses were slightly under budget.


Welcoming Arms

On December 29, 2020, my sister, Gloria, who lives in Orlando, emailed me a Calvin and Hobbes comic strip.









In the first frame, six-year-old Calvin shouts, "Mom, the washer is done." From afar, his mother calls back, "OK."

In the second frame, Calvin asks: "Aren't you going to put the wash in the dryer?" His mom, sitting in front of a computer, answers: "Calvin, can't you see I'm busy right now??"

In the third panel, Calvin goes to Hobbes and calmly reports, "She says she's busy." In the final panel, Hobbes is shown soaking wet, with his strong tiger arms holding himself up as he peers out of the washer and looks frustrated, his chin resting on his hands. As water spills out of the washing machine, Hobbes, looking depressed, declares, "I hope the next time she takes a bath, there aren't any towels."

While reading the creative comic strip of Bill Watterson, who, alas, retired in 1995, my mind zoomed to São Paulo, Brazil. Why? Just as Calvin was unable to help his beloved Tiger, Mike was, at times, unable to rescue his "blankey" from either the washer or the dryer in our laundry room. Plus, just as Calvin dragged Hobbes around throughout the family home and even outside in their yard, Mike did the same with his cherished soft, yellow blanket that his Aunt Gloria had created for him in anticipation of his birth in 1972. Of course, both Hobbes and Mike's blanket needed frequent washings in the family washing machines.

One day, Mike, tired and needing a re-energizing nap, told me he could not find his blankey; i responded that it was in the dryer after having been in the washing machine. Mike turned toward the dryer with a sad, forlorn look. Soon, Mike lay down right on the concrete floor next to the dryer and not very patiently awaited the end of the drying cycle. Fortunately, his beautiful soft, cuddly blanket was promptly dry and pleasantly warm. Removing it from the dryer, i joyfully placed it in Mike's welcoming arms. Immediately he hugged it tightly and headed for his bedroom, where his bed—much more comfortable than the laundry room floor—awaited him.

Sometimes we human beings—in ways similar to Hobbes and to Mike's blanket— are surely in need of physical bathing, spiritual bathing, renewal, and solace. Fortunately, God and God's everlasting arms are always eager to hold us, envelope us, comfort us, and invigorate us.

IKC UCC Southeast Association Eviction Ministry Update

We received another call this month from a tenant we had helped in the past. She had just started a new job, but was already one month behind on her rent. She won't get paid in time to pay her late rent before her landlord files for eviction. (Her landlord gave her a three day notice.) Even if she did use her check to pay her late rent, what would she use to pay her current rent?

This story is all too familiar. So many families are living paycheck to paycheck. Even a brief time of unemployment (due to injury, illness, etc) can create a cycle of late fees and dodging eviction....or in some cases, not dodging it.

We are a small, entirely volunteer based ministry with a budget that relies entirely on the donations of individuals like you. That means that helping two tenants avoid eviction could wipe out our entire budget for several months. The hardest thing we have to do is choose whether or not helping someone we've already helped once before will mean not being able to help someone new who calls next week. We almost had to make that decision about the tenant mentioned above. Fortunately, a last minute donation came in, and her landlord agreed not to file for eviction if we could deliver the check in hand to her office before 5:00p.m.

Most organizations are not set up to be able to act in a matter of hours or even days. That's one of the wonderful things about our ministry. We are grateful for those of you who make donations so we can do this incredible work and hear the sigh of relief and the smile on the other end of the phone when we get to tell someone that they won't lose their home. Wouldn't you love to be a part of this?

United Church of Christ NEWS: TV series explores abiding power of Black church

The United Church of Christ is in "The Black Church." The TV special, that is.

The four-hour documentary, airing this month on PBS, features several UCC ministers.

Viewers can check local air dates at the <u>series web page</u>. They can also stream it there — or <u>on YouTube</u> — in two episodes of two hours each. Harvard Professor <u>Henry Louis Gates Jr.</u> wrote and created the series.

Six UCC ministers

The UCC is visible throughout as part of the wider Black church. Among many ministers and public figures on screen are:

- The Rev. **Otis Moss III**. He is senior pastor of <u>Trinity UCC</u>, Chicago, and was an advisor to the series.
- The Rev. Dwight Andrews. He is senior minister of <u>First Congregational UCC</u>, Atlanta, and was an advisor to the series.
- The Rev. **Andrew Young**. A member of First Congregational, Atlanta, he was part of the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.'s core team in the 1960s. He was also, later, mayor of Atlanta and the U.S. ambassador to the United Nations.
- The Rev. Jeremiah Wright. He is pastor emeritus of Trinity UCC, Chicago.
- The Rev. Yvette Flunder. She is founder and senior pastor of <u>City of Refuge UCC</u>, Oakland, Calif., and presiding bishop of the <u>Fellowship of Affirming Ministries</u>.
- The Rev. **Traci Blackmon**. She is associate general minister of <u>Justice and Local Church Ministries</u>. She was also pastor of <u>Christ The King UCC</u>, Florissant, Mo., through 2020, when her interview was filmed.

Wide range of topics

Their topics include the power of the pulpit, the role of music, the church as an agent of social and racial justice, and issues of women's and LGBTQ inclusion.

"The Black church to me still remains the strongest demonstration of God with us that we have," Blackmon says near the end of the documentary. She also offers a comment about the church's historic local power — and a clue about its future.

"It is those small Black churches that have made the difference in our communities," she says. "It is that strength that I want the church to tap back into."
