We have been alongside Cassidy since she arrived at First Congregational and plan to "stick with her" as she finishes her studies at CTS and prepares for ordination into the United Church of Christ.

My wife Judy and I comprise her Support Team. We meet monthly beyond phone calls, emails, letters written for her such as her application for Member-in-Discernment with the IN-KY Conference, reading her blogs, watching her in worship services, observing her creations for worship especially the Blue Christmas service, and adult study, covering the Thursday Spiritual Support group when I was in the hospital and rehab, writing evaluations for CTS about her, then going into stress-mode over the recent Pastoral Letter sent to all of you because of a death threat on her life — she is like another daughter — so we naturally worried about her and made immediate contact for her safety after Pastor Sarah called us — so happy everything is okay to date.

I share with you a part of one of her blogs about death and grieving:

"Things are Different: Stay Soft. Be Tender. Let Yourself Rest (and eat a little chocolate)

That is enough. You are enough. However you're doing this, you're doing it right. You're doing a good job.

Things are different: Grieve. Slow down. Pay Attention. Stay Tender. Repeat.

And, don't forget to eat a little chocolate."


Pastoral Congregation Relations Committee

Our **May 16** worship service will be dedicated to our W.I.S.E. for Mental Health covenant with guest preacher Daniel Finnegan-Hosey and a "talk-back" Buzz on Zoom following worship. More information about this event is offered by our Mental Health Team.

Our Faith In Indiana Team is continuing communications with State Senator Rodric Bray's deputy chief of staff, Skip Brown, and more will be shared about coming interactions with Mr. Brown and/or Senator Bray. A Zoom meeting on **May 6** at 7:00 PM is scheduled for a legislative debrief of what worked and what needs improvement in future FII interactions with lawmakers. Bread for the World Offering of Letters, 2020

Again, this year our Offering of Letters will be virtual due to the pandemic. We will be writing and mailing our letters to our Senators and Representatives in Congress from home or emailing them.

Members will be contacted by and receive information and sample letters in early May from our Bread for the World team members. We



ask that after writing or emailing you report to the team or the church office (shannon@fcindy.org) with the names of those to whom you wrote or emailed and the method. We then report our total to the Indiana Bread chapter. We hope to do even better than last year. On May 2, Rev. Dick Hamm will be our guest at Adult Ed. speaking about BFW. Our Bread for the World worship service will be on May 9.

First Congregational has been a covenant member of Bread for the World since 1984, only two years after BFW was founded. It is an ecumenical, bipartisan Christian advocacy organization urging our nation's decision makers to end hunger at home and abroad.

The theme of this year's Offering of Letters is "End Child Hunger," and deals with the impact of the pandemic here and abroad. Now more than 270 million people are facing extreme hunger, up from 135 million before the pandemic. In the U.S. 1 in 4 children are at risk of hunger, and 40% of black and Latino families struggle to feed their children. The first focus is to expand the Child Tax Credit by

- Increasing the benefit from \$2,000 to \$3,600 for children up to 6 (the most vulnerable) and to \$3,000 for those 6-17.
- Paying this in monthly installments of \$300 for younger children and \$250 for older ones.
- Making it equally available to all families at \$0 income through middleincome.

This expansion would do more to reduce hunger and poverty among the nation's children than any other single program has in decades. Poverty would be reduced among Black children by 52%, Latino children by 45%, Native American by 62%, AAPI children by 37%, and white children by 39%.

The international focus is to increase U.S. leadership and funding for global nutrition programs without which an entire generation may be denied of their God-given right to flourish.

Rev. Dr. Dick Hamm to speak on "A Christian Response to Hunger"

As part of our Bread for the World Sunday, the Rev. Dr. Dick Hamm will speak on this topic during Adult Education on **May 2** at 9:30 AM via Zoom. Join us for this special presentation by a gifted theologian and teacher.



Dick served as a minister of Disciples congregations for 23 years, as Regional Minister of Tennessee, and as General Minister and President from 1993-2003 (during which time he cast "2020 Vision for the CC (DoC)". He was the first Executive Director of Christian Churches Together in the USA, and has served as a Vice President of the National Council of Churches and a member of the World Council of Churches Central Committee. He worked for 12 years as a church consultant to mainline Protestant churches and organizations. His most recent book is "Recreating The

Church: Leadership For The Post-Modern Age" (Chalice, 2007). Now retired, he teaches at Christian Theological Seminary and is a member of the Board of Trustees. He is chair of the board of the Indianapolis Center For Congregations, vice chair of the National City Christian Church Foundation, and a board member of the Center for Interfaith Cooperation. Dick is a leader of the US-Pakistan Interreligious Coalition (UPIC), thus traveling to Pakistan regularly; and active locally on Bread For The World Indiana Leadership Team. Dick and Mindy live in Indianapolis and attend Central Christian Church. They have two adult children and six grandchildren. Dick also enjoys astronomy, camping, and gardening. The Trevor Project

One of our opportunities for Church giving that is focused on mental health is the Trevor Project. Trevor was the name of a film about a gay youth considering suicide. This film led to the creation of the Trevor Project, which was the first, and now most prominent, nationwide, 24-hour, crisis and suicide prevention helpline for LGBTQ youth.

This need was highlighted in Indiana when the columnist and podcaster Dan Savage learned about the 2010 death of a gay teenager from Greensburg, Indiana, and in reaction started the "It Gets Better" campaign. Savage wrote that "Billy Lucas was just 15 when he hanged himself in a barn on his grandmother's property. He reportedly endured intense bullying at the hands of his classmates—classmates who called him a fag and told him to kill himself. His mother found his body. Nine out of ten gay teenagers experience bullying and harassment at school, and gay teens are four times likelier to attempt suicide. Many LGBT kids who do kill themselves live in rural areas, exurbs, and suburban areas, places with no gay organizations or services for queer kids."

The Trevor Lifeline is supported by both the Indiana State Board of Health and our local Indiana Youth Group as an important and potential life saving resource for Indiana's LGBTQ youth. The link to their website is: https://www.thetrevorproject.org/

Need a Lift in Your Spirit? Join us every Thursdays for Spiritual Support Group for Mental Health at 5:00-6:00PM on Zoom

This gathering is open to everyone and is an informal time to check-in about how you are doing, get emotional support from church family, and offer prayer for one another as we navigate nurturing positive mental health in these difficult days.

We are an open group with confidentiality guidelines. Sessions are on Zoom and led by Pastor Rev. Dr. Sarah Lund and Rev. Dr. Patrick Larracey, co-chair of the church's WISE Team. Mental Health First Aid Training – May 15th

A year ago the WISE Mental Health Team received a grant to provide a one day workshop for lay persons on Adult Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) for members of our congregation but could not do the training due to the pandemic. What does this training include? It is a nationally recognized early intervention public education program. It teaches adults how to recognize signs/symptoms of potential mental health challenges, how to listen nonjudgmentally, to give reassurance to someone who may be experiencing a mental health challenge and to refer that person to appropriate professional services.

The Adult MHFA course is currently virtual. Participants will complete a 2 hour self-paced online exercise prior to May 15th through a link sent after online registration. On May 15th registrants will participate in a Zoom class from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. with breaks in midmorning, midafternoon and lunch. After the class, participants will receive a link to an online quiz which, when successfully completed, will certify them in Mental Health First Aid.

Thanks to the grant, the cost of the training has been reduced from \$50 to \$25 per person. In addition, several scholarships are available to make your cost zero. When mailing your payment to the church, please put Mental Health First Aid in the memo line of your check. If you wish to pay online through the church website, you will need to send an email to Cheryl Dillenback, Financial Secretary, at dillenback@sbcglobal.net to tell her your online payment is for Mental Health First Aid training.



May 16th- Mental Health Sunday Buzz

We are fortunate to have a guest preacher at our virtual Mental Health Sunday this year who has also agreed to do a Buzz after Worship. David Finnegan-Hosey is a chaplain-in-residence at Georgetown University. He holds a Master's in Divinity from Wesley Theological Seminary and is certified in Mental Health First Aid to provide initial help to people experiencing challenges with depression and anxiety. He was diagnosed as dealing with bipolar disorder after a series of psychiatric hospitalizations. Currently he speaks and writes about the connections of mental illness, mental health and faith.



During our Buzz he will be discussing his 2018 book "Christ on the Psych Ward" published by Church Publishing. Though you do not have to have read this book to attend and benefit from his talk, the WISE Mental Health Team have purchased a small number of books we will loan to the first few people requesting them. You can also order his book- a paperback costing \$14.95 from Amazon or Barnes and Noble. Unfortunately, I couldn't find it online in the library, though it may be possible to request that it be added to their collection.

Highlights:

- **Income** for the quarter was \$55,600. This was \$10,800 below our 2021 budget due to a \$10,000 shortfall in pledge receipts. Overall contributions were \$7,300 behind last year. However, April pledge receipts have been very strong, so I anticipate we will close some of that gap in April.
- **Expenses** of \$61,900 were \$1,600 below budget, with most of the savings coming from House & Grounds. This savings is likely just timing. All other areas are running essentially right on budget.
- Cash despite the shortfall in contributions, cash was still solid at over \$40,000.
- **PPP Funding** good news our 2020 Payroll Protection Program loan of \$34,450 was forgiven in March (you can see it's reflected as income in the first quarter). Also, we received "second round" PPP loan funding of \$34,667 in April. These funds will allow us to continue to pay our employees and musicians throughout 2021 as if we were operating fully in person.

FC Foundation Report- First Quarter of 2021

The FC Foundation met via Zoom on Tuesday April 13, 2021. Our financial advisor from Goelzer Investment, Dean Weseli, presented a portfolio of our investments to date in 2021. He commented the economy has seen some recovery and there is potential for further recovery in the coming months depending on what happens with interest rates, inflation and investment. His concern is the amount of debt the country is taking on, but that could be mitigated by job growth and if inflation and interest rates remain modest. As of March 31, 2021, the Endowment Fund contains \$845,268 and the Capital Improvement Fund contains \$75,828 for a total holding of \$921,095.

Though not considered in detail during our meeting, the FC holdings in United Church funds, separate from Goelzer, include the Minister's Fund; the Organ Fund; the Traditional Music Fund; and the Chatauqua Fund. These funds have been donated by church members currently and in the past with stipulations that the funds only be used for that named purpose. Donations to the aforementioned funds are welcomed and appreciated at any time someone wishes.

In May, the 1857 Society, congregation members who have pledged to give funds to FC in their estate planning and prospective members of the society, meet for a luncheon. The Board felt the virtual meeting in 2020 was not optimal to educate and honor those donors and potential donors. Therefore, the luncheon is postponed until later in the year in hopes we might have an inperson luncheon. We will give more information about luncheon plans after our next meeting, Tuesday July 13, 2021 at 9 a.m. EDT.

MDiv/MTS Student Cassidy Hall Debuts New Podcast and Film

Much of MDiv/MTS student **Cassidy Hall**'s adult life has explored the intersection of creativity and spirituality. As an outgrowth of her time at CTS and her own personal development and learning, she recently launched a new podcast and is preparing for the festival debut of a new documentary film.

While working as a filmmaker in Los Angeles, Hall became interested in attending seminary after taking adult education courses at her local church. At the suggestion of a friend who lived in Indianapolis, Hall looked into the degree programs at CTS, which offered the financial assistance she needed to fully engage an MDiv program. Entering as an artist and filmmaker with a hunger for theological education and spiritual growth, Hall said that she quickly found a

home at CTS, whose "eclectic and ecumenical" faculty and staff "create a spaciousness for learning and individual development like no other academic institution I've ever been a part of."

Among the many formative experiences she has had at CTS—including courses with Prof. Bill Kincaid, Prof. Helene Russell, and Prof. Kimberly Russaw, along with her field experience as a student pastor at First Congregational UCC—Hall said that the Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference and the Mixed Methods Preaching Conference have been "life-changing." She explained that her introduction to Black and Womanist theologies has been especially transformative, in particular the Womanist insistence on "the survival and liberation of all people." Inspired by these experiences and what she has learned along the way, Hall launched a new podcast in February, Contemplating Now, which is being hosted by Christian Century. Having long been drawn to the contemplative life, Hall guit her job in 2011 and traveled to all 17 Trappist monasteries in the United States after reading Thomas Merton's New Seeds of Contemplation. Existing in what she refers to as the "white-contemplative world" for nearly a decade, Hall said that she became increasingly aware of how it too often "remains tethered to systems of oppression." Noting the influence of Barbara A. Holmes and Therese Taylor-Stinson, she explained that "the BILPOC contemplative expressions, and Black contemplative expression in particular, have helped me to understand the power of full embodiment in contemplative life when it comes to actions and the way one shows up in the world." As a response, Hall launched the new podcast, where she interviews scholars, mystics, and activists to discuss the intersection of contemplation and social justice.

Along with the podcast, Hall has been working on another project pertaining to spirituality and contemplation. As mentioned, Hall has been deeply influenced by the life and works of Thomas Merton, the prominent twentieth century Trappist monk and writer. Last year, she completed her film <u>Day of a Stranger</u> about Merton's years living in a hermitage, which will debut at a film festival in May.

Hall is now preparing for ordination in the UCC and considering further graduate studies. Reflecting on her time in seminary, she said, "CTS has taught me what it means to be an embodied person of faith—to be one whose whole life is reflective of one's learning, growth, and continued understanding. While I've never been one who can easily compartmentalize, I'm grateful that CTS welcomes the wholeness of its students (in all of our uniqueness) and values our growth, always making more room for our continual becoming."

IKC UCC Southeast Association Eviction Ministry: 2020-2021 Report

The Southeast Association Eviction Ministry is a ministry of the Southeast Association of the Indiana-Kentucky Conference of the United Church of Christ. This ministry began in 2019 as a result of a need in our communities to assist individuals and families facing eviction who do not meet the criteria for other financial or housing assistance programs.

Since January of 2020, we have provided assistance to four eviction assistance requestes. Two of these requests were in 2020, and we have had two requests so far in 2021. Request funds are paid directly to the landlord or property management company.

Many churches, like First Congregational, receive calls regularly from individuals asking for assistance due to an impending eviction. This ministry works with UCC congregations in the Southeast Association to provide assistance when these calls arise. We know that most congregations cannot afford to help someone with an entire month's rent. This is why we ask congregations (and members) to contribute as much as possible as often as possible, so that when a need arises, we can step in and help.
