Minister's Message

Changes

With the new year comes some necessary changes: those of us who still write checks have to remember that it is 2018 now, many of us are now in a new fiscal year for financial reporting, and regardless of when our birthdays are, now we are really another year older. Yesterday was the last moment for a century when every living adult had been born in the 20th Century, and every living child had been born in the 21st Century! Talk about generation gaps!

To be sure, these feel like dramatic changes but changes rarely happen so suddenly. What really changed between Sunday and Monday? Real change takes time, preparation, a change of culture, clarity of roles and purposes, a rededication to what we are about now, which may be different from what we were about then. This Saturday you will have the opportunity to come and meet the person who is the candidate for the next 'settled minister'. On Sunday they will preach and then the members of First Congregational Church, United Church of Christ will meet to discuss and vote as to whether to extend a call to the candidate to be the next minister.

This is what we have worked for these past two and a half years: gaining clarity over the conflicts that arose in 2014-15, structural issues that made such conflicts inevitable, grieving over the loss of valued friends and restructuring, re-focusing on a mission that is clearer and more focused. At least for now. We never solve all our problems, we merely replace the ones that have dogged us with a new set of hopefully better problems for the future.

The plan is that if the congregation extends the call to the candidate, that person will start full time service here on March 1. While there is such a thing as anticipatory grief, the two months will be a long time, filled with the details of what needs to happen now, what will have to wait and why is this taking so long?

The truth of the matter is that the clergy do not exist for themselves, but for you, the church. We are here to help you in your walk of faith, to help this congregation in its faithful service of our God. You have grown and changed in these past few years, just was you will continue to grow and change in the next few years. All to the glory of God! Blessed be change!

The initial point of pain will be the realization that will come on the first day that they are not already marvelous, they are first drafts for a project that will require three or four drafts.

Sadly, no. There is always more to do, strategies that could be better, improvements that could be made.

An Ice Storm Moment

As I write this E-pistle on Wednesday morning there is a long line of cars driving slowly up Pennsylvania St. past the church. The bad news in this is that it probably means that there has been an accident on Meridian. The good news is that there will be another hundred people or so who might think to themselves "Hey! There's a church here!"

This led to two thoughts: We struggle at times to be known in Indianapolis. This means that we are not likely to get drop in visitors who want to try us out. We are also safer than many churches---one of our neighbors spent \$20,000 last year on security and were looking at a twenty four hour a day contract that would raise that budget item to \$200,000. Sometimes it is not so bad to be well hidden! But it also means that for us to be easily found requires a fairly aggressive approach to getting our name out. You can help with this by 'liking' the church's Facebook Page, sharing the occasional posting. Our alternative (and we might need to explore this in the years to come) is a fairly constant series of advertisements in newspapers or selected radio stations. One time ads don't work very well, an image has to be built up over time. That is expensive, or we would already be doing it. For now we are content with an active webpage (fciindy.org) and Facebook

presence and having activities that are worthy of notice both in our lives and in our community.

The second thought is about surprises. We know about the wrong, bad news, kind. But there are also pleasant surprises. Of friendship when you didn't expect it, of beauty that is simply there in our lives. Like a church up a gentle hill on Pennsylvania Street!
