FCC - which often takes a lead in UCC initiatives - is a little behind. According to a list from http://www.ucc.org/just\_peace\_churches, there are at least 162 UCC churches that have declared themselves to be a Just Peace Church. Four of those churches are in the Indiana-Kentucky conference:
