Minister's Message

Dear First Congregational Family,

What is the purpose of prayer? I've been praying off and on my whole life, at least since I was a young child. At first I was taught that prayer was talking to God. I learned the Lord's Prayer and the bedtime prayer "Now I lay me down to sleep and pray the Lord my soul to keep." As I've gotten older, I've come to experience prayer also as a way of a listening to God. For me, some of the most profound moments of connection to God come out of a time of praying in silence. For me, prayer is a way to clear my mind of the clutter and to tune into the deep peace that comes when we rest in the heart of God.

I am not always just listening to God...I still talk to God, too. I try to take more time to listen to God these days. In worship on Sundays, we say many prayers out loud. And we also listen, we also make time for silence during worship as part of our prayer. For some this time of silence might be too short and for others the silence might be too long. I've had more than one person who is visiting our church tell me it reminds them of a Friend's Meeting House. It might be the way the sun shines through the sanctuary windows and bathes us in God's light. It might be those moments of silence, too. In our New Creation service, we pray using candles, lighting them to honor the joy or concern that has been lifted up. When we are collecting joys and concerns during our worship, I feel as though the silence in-between the sharing is just as sacred, just as holy, just as God-filled. I am

grateful that we are comfortable with many ways to pray.

Today I am giving thanks for all the ways that we pray...with words, with silence, with music, with tears, with candles, laughter, with our whole selves.


