Recently I read an article where the writer was out jogging and saw a young man running toward her wearing a shirt with the slogan, "Don't go to church." When she turned around to look at his back, she saw these words, "Be the church."

Protect the environment. Care for the poor. Embrace diversity.

Reject racism. Forgive often. Love God. Fight for the powerless. Share earthly and spiritual resources. Enjoy this life!

May we continue to be the church as we carry out our stated mission and plan for 2017.

Sunday Adult Class

All classes meet in the Library (room 212) at 9:45 a.m. All are welcome!

During September the sessions on Sunday morning will continue the study <u>Into The World: The Acts of the Apostles.</u> The experiences of the early church as told by Luke in <u>Acts</u> will relate to our practices and experiences as much as possible. Specific class plans are:

<u>September 3</u> – Worth Hartman will present session #12, "Paul Upsets the Empire" "In Athens, Paul comes face to face with the hard core of pagan religion. Idolatry, which seems so primitive to moderns, is in reality alive and well in the present day. An idol may be defined as something in which one puts ultimate trust, other than the true God....Paul's arguments hold up well for those today who put their ultimate trust in money, violence, astrology, superstition, or a host of other idols."

<u>September 10</u> - Rich Gibson will present session 13, "Riots and Encouragement" "The riot at Ephesus echoes several themes: the worship of idols - particularly money; Paul's willingness to suffer as long as the gospel is proclaimed; the help and companionship of the Christian fellowship.... [The] references to the ministry of encouragement...and the weekly breaking of bread by the community of faith.....are two basics which the Christian church in every age needs to keep center stage."

<u>September 17</u> – Nancy Dickinson will present session 14 "Story Without End" "Paul has been in constant danger of death almost since the moment of his conversion. Knowing Christ is not the promise of an easy life; it means a life of servanthood to the purposes of God. God has time and again spared Paul, not for Paul's sake, but for the sake of the gospel." How can we today keep the story alive and going?

<u>September 24</u> – Rev. Michael Montgomery will lead a discussion with Scott Shirai from the UCC's national Office for Philanthropy and Stewardship.

Mission of the Month, UCC Open and Affirming Coalition

Our Mission of the Month is the United Church of Christ (UCC) Open and Affirming (ONA) Coalition. Over 30 years ago the UCC adopted a resolution that launched the ONA movement in the UCC. The ONA Coalition is an independent non-profit part of the UCC with funding coming primarily from individual and congregational gifts. The UCC ONA Coalition does not receive funds from Our Church's Wider Mission, a major source of revenue for other UCC mission initiatives. The Coalition is currently working on building a 100% Open and Affirming Church. They aim to make UCC congregations safe church homes for LGBTQ and transgender Christians of all ages and their families, advocate for strong anti-bullying and suicide prevention policies in all public and private schools and make UCC churches safe for LGBTQ youth. The Coalition also supports LGBTQ asylum seekers from countries where being LGBTQ is criminalized, works to assure equal protection under the law, and resists assaults on LGBTQ civil rights. You can contribute loose change and dollar bills or put larger bills or a check in an envelope marked ONA Coalition or Sept MOM. Make checks out to FCC and put ONA Coalition in the memo line. We can all be grateful to the founders who began the FCCF about 50 years ago. It is managed by a Board, reports to the church Trustees, and is always subject to the will of the Congregation. A report for the past year appears in each church annual report. Contributions strengthen the FCCF and are needed to insure its continued health. The most common methods of giving are individual contributions and bequests. When giving, please specify which fund you intend to support: the Endowment, Capital Improvements Fund, Ministers Fund, or Organ Fund.

Important Information Concerning the Gift of Stock

In the past giving the church your gift of stock was a bit confusing. However, the good news is that we have finalized an easy way to complete this transfer! In all situations where you would like to donate stock, you just need to tell your broker to use the following information to deposit those shares into the First Congregational Brokerage account.

In all situations, Fidelity (our broker) is instructed to sell the stock when transfer is complete and then to move the money to our cash portion of the account. Overall, we are slightly positive to our budget. Income is \$3,300 below budget due to a continued shortfall in non-pledge contributions. Expenses are almost \$7,600 below the budget. The expense trends are similar to what we saw for the first 6 months:

- Admin & Operations \$3,000 below budget Most of this is true savings continued kudos to Cheryl Dillenback for her outstanding efficiency!
- Outreach & Service \$4,800 below budget a matter of timing, as most of our mission contributions are made later in the year.
- House & Grounds \$1,875 above budget mostly attributable to natural gas.

It's certainly good that we are doing slightly better than our budget; however, we are spending more than we are taking in, so we still have much work to do to end the year in the black. Thanks to everyone for your continued generous giving and careful expense management.



Family Promise Clothing drive starts Friday, August 25

Here's a way to get your fall change of season clothing inventory done and do some good in the process. Inventory what you have, pick out those gently used clothes you no longer wear, bring them to church in white kitchen trash bags or use the trash bags provided in the cloak room, drop them in the white laundry baskets and help out Family Promise. **No shoes or accessories, please.** Thanks in advance, because every bag helps Family Promise receive a \$5 clothing voucher from Goodwill to help families with emergency clothing for children, or even work apparel for adults. Below are the important dates to keep in mind:

Friday, August 25 to Sunday, September 10 - Congregations collect clothing

Monday, September 11 to Saturday, September 16 - Congregations deliver clothing to the FPGI Day Center at 1850 N. Arsenal Avenue, Indianapolis, IN 46218 between 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

Family Promise will again be here at FCC! Family Promise works with families to empower their move from being homeless to having homes. They provide training for job search, skill building for caring for homes, and assistance in finding a house or apartment that will be sustainable in the long run for the family. Our part in this ministry is to house three or four families for one week, twice a year, while they are in training to be housed and employed. To do this we will need groups that will plan and cook dinners, volunteers for specific tasks such as driving the Family Promise van to pick up and deliver our guests, initial set-up and final take down, and two people each night to sleep in the church as chaperones/emergency resources. We will receive our next guest on October 1through October 8. More information is coming! Please contact Katie Booth or the church office if you are interested in assisting.

Faith In Action Team of Witness & Welcome

The Faith In Action Team met at 3pm, 8/20, during our Chautauqua Day event. Nine members participated in this organizational meeting. They covenanted to be a non-partisan team for addressing public issues based in faith and scripture as followers of Jesus.

Initial issues for monitoring on a weekly basis were: environment; minimum wage; A.L.I.C.E.; voting rights; criminal justice & drug crimes; witnessing on short notice; immigration & deportation; dishonesty in government; electoral college inequities; and gerrymandering in state government. Many more to be discerned.

The next meeting is called for Sunday, 9/17, 7:00-8:30 PM. For more info contact Jim Rutherford, Convener.

PRCR Committee launched: one of the committees called for in our new constitution is the PCRC – Pastor Congregation Relations Committee. This committee has now launched and met with Michael and we want everyone to be aware – and to bring any questions or concerns to us. The current committee members are: Nancy Dickinson, Bill Gillette, Jim Rutherford, and Karen Walker. Our job description (from our council approved charter) is to: provide support and advocacy for the relationship between the pastor & congregation by serving as a liaison for concerns and feedback, interpretation, and conflict mediation. Working through things directly between individuals is preferred, but not all issues may work that way. We will provide process and support for facilitating through any concerns if needed (other than safe church related issues which need to be referred to that committee). Please see any one of us for additional information or if you have any concerns or issues you would like to raise.

Safe Church Committee: It is important to keep this policy – the Safe Church Policy Concerning Harassment, Exploitation, and Stalking Prevention - and its process in front of everyone at the church. Diana Kemper and Larry Eckel are the current committee members who are dedicated to investigating any questions or issues raised that fall under the purview of this policy which is in place to promote a safe environment for all. There is a copy of the policy on our website on the faith and fellowship page and copies are available at the bulletin board at church if anyone wants more information. There will be a repeated education event about this policy early next year.
