

Rev. Dr. Sarah Griffith Lund Begins her Ministry

Rev. Lund will begin her ministry with the congregation on March 1. "For our first year together," said Lund, "we will focus on building trusting and life-giving relationships with each other, the neighborhood and wider community!"

Ordained with standing in both the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and the United Church of Christ, Rev. Lund served since 2014 as vice president for seminary advancement at Christian Theological Seminary. Prior to that appointment she worked with nearly fifty congregations in Florida to strengthen their vitality, and as a congregational pastor responsible for preaching, teaching, presiding over the sacraments, providing pastoral care, and community ministry.

A proliferate speaker and writer about mental health, Rev. Lund is the author of the widely regarded book "Blessed are the Crazy: Breaking the Silence About Mental Illness, Family and Church." She blogs at www.sarahgriffithlund.com and is an active board member of the Martin Luther King Community Center in Indianapolis. This breadth of leadership experience should serve us well.

Rev. Lund's formal education includes a bachelor of arts in religion from Trinity University, a master of divinity from Princeton Theological Seminary, a master of social work from Rutgers University, and a doctor of ministry from McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago. She also completed the certificate in fundraising management from the Lilly Family School of Philanthropy at Indiana University.

When asked what she hopes will characterize the congregation's ministry during her tenure, Lund replied, "I hope we will be seen as a place of radical hospitality that welcomes all. I hope we flourish as a progressive, inclusive, and spiritually alive servant community of Jesus!" Lund received the prestigious Engle Award in Preaching from Princeton Theological Seminary. Lund's first Sunday in the pulpit will be **March 4**. All are invited to worship at 11:00 AM and 5:30 PM at First Congregational United Church of Christ, 7171 North Pennsylvania Street, in the Broad Ripple area.

Lund is married to Jonathan Lund, who is a medical massage therapist at Carmel Wellness. They are the very proud parents of second grader Carter.

A Prayer by Archbishop Oscar Romero

It helps, now and then, to step back and take a long view. The kingdom is not only beyond our efforts, it is even beyond our vision. We accomplish in our lifetime only a tiny fraction of the magnificent enterprise that is God's work. Nothing we do is complete, which is a way of saying that the kingdom always lies beyond us.

No statement says all that could be said.

No prayer fully expresses our faith.

No confession brings perfection.

No pastoral visit brings wholeness.

No program accomplishes the church's mission.

No set of goals and objectives includes everything.

This is what we are about.

We plant the seeds that one day will grow.

We water seeds already planted, knowing that they hold future promise.

We lay foundations that will need further development.

We provide yeast that produces far beyond our capabilities.

We cannot do everything, and there is a sense of liberation in realizing that. This enables us to do something, and to do it very well. It may be incomplete, but it is a beginning, a step along the way, an opportunity for the Lord's grace to enter and to do the rest. We may never see the end results, but that is the difference.

In all situations, Fidelity (our broker) is instructed to sell the stock when transfer is complete and then to move the money to our cash portion of the account. Sunday Morning Adult Class – Report 2017

(This report was not included in the annual report.)

This year we have enjoyed a variety of programs and discussions which are one of the aims of those gathered each Sunday at (approximately) 9:45 a.m.

We began the year with a session "Keeping the Faith in Trump's America" which resulted in a good discussion. Mary Lou Rothe had brought in a number of challenging articles to consider.

The following Sunday we commenced the Kerygma series, "Good News for All: the Gospel of Luke," which lasted through Easter, with the crucifixion and resurrection coming in Holy Week.

On Earth Day we visited the Memorial gardens on a tour led by Wendy Baldwin who pointed out especially the wild flowers just popping up.

On April 20th, we experimented with a lesson from "The Wired Word." Early May we heard about the progress Bread for the World is making in helping people across the world in growing food for themselves, followed by a week of writing letters to our congressional representatives and senators, requesting continued support of basic nutrition and food programs.

By the end of May we were ready for another Kerygma series: "Into the World: The Acts of the Apostles." This lasted through the summer, broken by a session on charitable giving in June. On August 20th we participated in the Chautauqua all-church program.

Fall brought consideration of violence and possibilities for peace in our world. We spent two sessions on violence and peace in the three Abrahamic traditions, and considered different kinds of violence in between: violence of hoarding, of the tongue and of oppression.

On Thanksgiving Sunday, Carol Sowle presented an "accurate history" - i.e. what is known about the first Pilgrim Thanksgiving meal, based on the eye witness reports by William Bradford and Edward Winslow. Carol also presented a history of how the Thanksgiving celebration that we know today came about and has evolved over the years.

In December we began the Kergyma study of "Shalom: A Study of the Biblical Concept of Peace, "partly as a prelude to looking at becoming a UCC Just Peace Church. This study is extending into 2018.

Leaders for these sessions have been Nancy Dickinson, Worth Hartman, Lianna Campos Saunders, Carol Sowle, and until November, Rich Gibson. New leaders encouraged.
