December Mission of the Month: The Christmas Fund – The Christmas Fund is one of the "5 for 5" offerings of the United Church of Christ that FC has committed to support. The Christmas Fund, formerly known as the "Veterans of the Cross Offering," gives congregations and members an opportunity to reach out in loving compassion, providing assistance to those who have so faithfully served our churches and now find themselves facing unexpected financial needs. These funds enable the Pension Board's Ministerial Assistance program to provide, on behalf of the whole Church, pension supplements, health premium supplements, emergency grants for health or unexpected travel expenses, and Christmas "Thank You" gift checks to individuals and families in need. This year's theme is "A Light Shines in the Darkness." Your gifts

this December will bring light into the darkness of financial need of deserving retired church workers and keep needed funds coming in the year ahead. Watch for the weekly bulletin inserts during Advent for stories of how individuals and their families have been helped by the Christmas Fund.

In 2018, gifts to the Christmas Fund enabled

- Small pension supplementation for 379 retired clergy and lay employees (\$1,453,050)
- Health benefits supplementation for 174 retired clergy and lay employees (\$429,903)
- Emergency grants for 49 individuals and families (\$60,526)
- Christmas "Thank You" gift checks to 401 retired clergy and lay employees (\$214.100)

Luke 1:26-35, 38

²⁶ Six months later, the angel Gabriel was sent from God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, ²⁷ to a young woman named Mary; she was engaged to a man named Joseph, of the house of David. ²⁸ Upon arriving, the angel said to Mary, "Rejoice, highly favored one! God is with you! Blessed are you among women!" ²⁹ Mary was deeply troubled by these words and wondered what the angel's greeting meant. ³⁰ The angel went on to say to her, "Don't be afraid, Mary. You have found favor with God. ³¹ You'll conceive and bear a son, and give him the name Jesus—'Deliverance.' ³² His dignity will be great, and he will be called the only begotten of God. God will give Jesus the judgment seat of David, his ancestor, ³³ to rule over the house of Jacob forever, and his reign will never end." ³⁴ Mary said to the angel, "How can this be, since I have never been with a man?" ³⁵ The angel answered her, "the Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you—hence the offspring to be born will be called the Holy One of God.

³⁸ Mary said, "I am the servant of God. Let it be done to me as you say." With that, the angel left her.

John 1:1-14

IN THE BEGINNING there was the Word; the Word was in God's presence, and the Word was God. 2 the Word was present to God from the beginning. ³ Through the Word all things came into being, and apart from the Word nothing came into being that has come into being. ⁴ In the Word was life, and that life was humanity's light—⁵ a Light that shines in the darkness, a Light that the darkness has never overtaken.

⁶ Then came one named John, sent as an envoy from God, ⁷ who came as a witness to testify about the Light, so that through his testimony everyone might believe. ⁸ He himself wasn't the Light; he only came to testify about the Light—the true Light that illumines all humankind. ⁹ The

Word was coming into the world— 10 was in the world—and though the world was made through the Word, the world didn't recognize it. 11 Though the Word came to its own realm, the Word's own people didn't accept it. 12 Yet any who did accept the Word, who believed in that Name, were empowered to become children of God—¹³ children born not of natural descent, nor urge of flesh, nor human will—but born of God. ¹⁴ And the Word became flesh and stayed for a little while among us; we saw the Word's glory—the favor and position a parent gives an only child—filled with grace, filled with truth.



ADVENT III

The Rev. Dr. Dallas A. "Dee" Brauninger

2019 has been a difficult year for the Rev. Dr. Dallas A. "Dee" Brauninger. Her husband, Bob, died in February. "Bob and I married while we were both in seminary," says Dee. "We had 52 years of married and professional life together." Last summer, Dee was also diagnosed with cancer and was anticipating surgery in the fall.

In the early 70's, Dee served a small community church in Boulder, Colorado, for five years. During those years, Dee and Bob fostered three teenage girls, adopted their son as a newborn, and then had a daughter.

Given their growing family responsibilities, the Brauningers determined that they wanted to "parent half-time and pastor half-time" in rural parishes. In 1976, they moved to Nebraska where they found a church willing to accept this arrangement—a breakthrough for the time. "We broke ice all around," says Dee.

Then in the late 1980's, Dee began to experience loss of vision and soon required service dogs to help her navigate the world. She notes that, "although I could no longer see, couldn't read, couldn't drive, I had no trouble being accepted."

Midway through her time at Hemingford, symptoms of Dee's rheumatoid arthritis prevented her from preaching. Not inclined to stop communicating, she wrote daily meditations for *These Days* as well as "Finding Voice," the ucc.org series about the Antoinette Brown Award recipients. She also edited the newsletter and launched the website of the UCC's Disabilities Ministries, on whose Board she served for many years.

Looking back on her career in ministry, Dee recalls, "Bob and I chose to serve as co-pastors at small or rural churches throughout our long ministry in Nebraska. We were both able to extend our ministry to the broader church. Bob served on the World Board, making several trips to Ghana. We loved this ministry.

"Each year, we were amazed by the generous giving from our churches to the Christmas Fund. How unexpected that we would be recipients in 2018. Bob and I each received a \$500 gift before he died from Parkinson's with Lewybody dementia. The gifts helped with living expenses and care of my service dog," says Dee.

Along with other recipients of much-needed financial assistance, Dee is grateful for the steadfast generosity of those who faithfully support the Christmas Fund each year with their gifts.
