Minister's Message

At this time in the life of the church:

Board and team members (and anybody else!) will gather this Saturday for empowerment and initial organization. We will come out of that meeting with a clearer understanding of the work of the Boards, initial leadership and hopefully some confidence in going forward. It is an important meeting---every Board has members on them who have never served on a church board before.

We celebrate the last Sunday of Epiphany, the season of the church year where we look at how Christ is manifested in the world. Our exact sermon series is on what it means to be church and this Sunday we will look at being light to the world and what that means.

Mission of the Month, Indiana Youth Group (IYG)

Indiana Youth Group (IYG) was founded in 1987 by Franklin College grads and partners Chris Gonzalez and Jeff Werner. Both men volunteered for the Gay and Lesbian Switchboard in Indianapolis and noticed the huge number of calls coming from youth under age 21 with issues of homelessness, suicide and dropout.

For over 30 years the mission of IYG has been to create safe spaces, provide wellness programming and educate LGBTQ youth and the community. The result is self-actualized, competent adults providing leadership and advocacy in our greater community.

With the assistance of grants, donations and fund raising, IYG moved into a newer and larger facility a few weeks ago. The new facility is located at 3733 N. Meridian and will allow IYG to increase its programming.

This year our monetary donations will be used in the following areas:

- SWAP Closet- IYG youth can obtain appropriate clothing for job interviews, school, or other life situations. IYG is also accepting donations of gently used clothing for these purposes.
- Food Pantry Each day that IYG is open meals provided by volunteer organizations are served to the youth. Often times this meal is the only food some of the youth have that day. The Pantry is available to provide nourishing food to youth for those days when the Center is closed.
- In late summer 2018, IYG and Trinity Episcopal Church will be opening Trinity
 House, an LGBTQ homeless shelter which will have space for 14 youth. Our
 donations will help furnish this facility to provide safe housing for youth who have
 been outcast from their families because they are LGBTQ.

Our generous support will help make a better present for the young people in our community. Within the last decade there has been a national project titled "It Gets Better"

to give hope to LGBTQ individuals. It can be better, today with our assistance

Minister's Message

What to like about this church

Any change brings about its own confusion as one way of doing things is replaced by another way. The new way may be infinitely better, but it is still a *change* and takes some getting used to. So in the next couple of weeks some patience is called for as the church says good bye to myself and welcomes Rev. Sarah Lund as its minister.

It helps to reflect a bit on what you are good at:

• FCC has networks of caring that create life long friendships and bonds between people. Dedicated volunteers call on people who are ill or shut in. The men's lunch group, Women's lunch, Circle IV, young adults group and others provide opportunities for friendship and bonding for more than business meetings, and this is important. We've got some work to do here---at the very least a younger women's/general adult group are called for to meet the needs of other age groups. But with a historic level of six fellowship circles, we have four empty slots!

- FCC is good at worship. I say that with a bit of trepidation, because one of the truths about our worship services is how they have changed over the years and with a new settled minister there will be additional changes to come just by the difference of personalities. We are not done changing! Visitors have told me that they liked our worship service because it feels like worship and has an informal formality to it. The sharing in prayer requests is a hall mark of that, even first time visitors feel comfortable in lifting up prayer requests (and that is remarkable!).
- FCC is good at spontaneous organization. That may be an oxymoron, but when something needs to happen, we rally around the person who lifts up the issue and leads. That happens again and again, so can be seen as part of our culture. We are 'good team players' with the wider church, within our church and within our denomination.
- FCC is good at being attentive to the needs of God in the world. We are not trapped in what we've always been (well, mostly) and are both today and historically willing to engage any issue.

The list goes on, I'm sure that you would want to add some aspects that I have left out. First Congregational is a wonderful church and does great work for God

Minister's Message

Last Words

These next two weeks are filled with the duties of leave-taking: packing up the office, Writing one last worship bulletin, arranging for activities that have to happen, delaying those that don't. Trying to think of what to say as part of my good-byes.

There actually is abundant research on famous good-byes. Jazz drummer Buddy Rich died after surgery in 1987. As he was being prepped for surgery, a nurse asked him, "Is there anything you can't take?" Rich replied, "Yeah, country music."

And the words of a general in the Civil War, on the front lines rallying his troops, responding to a soldier urging him to get down, "Bah! They couldn't hit the broad side of a barn from this dis..."
