Pastor's Reflections

Dear Church,

One of the blessings of serving in ministry with First Congregational is the collective courage and encouragement as a progressive congregation to work and speak out for justice. Our congregational Just Peace, WISE, and Open and Affirming covenants create a solid foundation for our shared witness. We have a long history of advocating for justice. As part of the United Church of Christ, we are part of a bold national faith-based movement to build a more just world for all.

As pastor, I am inspired by First Congregational to use my voice to share God's love and compassion for people who are oppressed by injustice. Recently, I joined other interfaith leaders in signing my name to a letter to elected officials to support reproductive justice as a matter of faith. You can read the full letter on the following page.

I was invited by Rabbi Sandy Sasso to join interfaith leaders at the Indiana Statehouse on July 25 as elected officials met with Vice President Kamala Harris for a special session about reproductive healthcare. I spoke at the rally as a member of the religious community supporting reproductive justice. I am grateful to be part of this witness for justice.

Thank you to the many members and friends of First Congregational who took time to write letters and to advocate for justice. We will keep knocking, keep asking, keep advocating, and "keep keeping on" because we know Jesus promises good will come. And so we will not give up.

An Open Letter from a Multi-Faith Collective for Reproductive Choice

We express our concern and protest today as a multi-faith collective of clergy and lay people across the State of Indiana.

The United States Supreme Court decision overturning Roe v. Wade and eliminating the federally protected right to abortion significantly impairs a woman's autonomy and ability to access basic health care. It also infringes on the free exercise of religion for those whose teachings allow for, and in some cases require, abortion as part of the care of women and families. Fundamental beliefs in many religions, align with the right to seek a safe and legal abortion for a variety of reasons.

We are a country of many faiths. Freedom of religion is a right guaranteed by our Constitution. Judaism, Islam, Hinduism, Catholicism, Protestant denominations, and other faith traditions differ in their teachings concerning reproductive matters. For example, the premise that human life begins at conception or that an embryo should be accorded legal protection is not a universally held tenet. Those who hold that belief have every right to do so, but Indiana should not privilege one particular Christian belief above other religious beliefs by codifying it into law. To do so violates the separation of church and state and robs other religious persons - who understand conception, reproduction, pregnancy, and autonomy differently - of the freedom to make these decisions in accordance with their core religious beliefs.

Importantly, we note that reproductive health care is a <u>uniquely</u> sensitive and private matter and one that <u>uniquely</u> affects women's ability to stand in equal citizenship, make choices in their and their families best interest, and determine how, when, and why to use their God-given talents. This is to say nothing of the complex and unpredictable medical circumstances women, including non-binary indviduals, may face during a pregnancy. We believe reproductive health care decisions, including abortion, rest with individuals, their physicians, and their faith. The majority of Americans agree. According to a 2022 Pew Research Center Study, 61% of U.S. adults believe that abortion should be legal in all or most cases.

Below we have included examples (<u>not</u> an exhaustive list) of statements from faith groups articulating their position on reproductive choice. Perspectives may be complex and differ within these communities - which is precisely the reason to protect freedom of religion on this issue.

As clergy and lay people across different religions, we raise our voices in concern and protest, As citizens across the state, we call on our elected leaders to honor the integrity, equality, and health of women and to preserve our constitution's guarantee of religious freedom.

Senior Councilor's Report

Judy Fletcher, Lead Councilor (June-September)

When I was twelve I spent my allowance at Pottinger's on a packet of deep blue delphinium seeds. I then planted them and waited. I'd never seen a delphinium in person but perhaps they were mentioned in The Secret Garden? Or perhaps I'd seen a photo in a magazine? After reading the packet, I carefully placed my seeds in the sunniest spot of the yard that had the richest soil. Nothing happened.

Three years ago, after we downsized to a lawn, I had to reinvent the flower gardens of the old house. On a whim, I bought a pot of blue delphiniums and planted them in a dry, narrow bed of heavy clay dominated by a black tarmac parking area. *This* delphinium has flourished. Why? Is it a fluke?

Last night I was watching 'Gardener's World' and their coverage of the Chelsea Garden Show. One of the presenters cupped her hand behind a glorious, deep blue delphinium bloom and told the camera that if one had heavy, clay soil, then the delphinium was *just* the flower to grow. Who knew?

As a church, are we flukes? Consider this: we are a progressive, well educated congregation in a state that often has very different values. Indiana ranks 40th out of 50 for educational attainment. 15% of our children live in poverty. Our infant mortality rate is 20% above the national average. And obstetrical care is totally lacking in 32 counties. As long as you are 18 or older, and haven't a court order forbidding it, you can openly carry a gun, no training required.

Our church supports individuals who call for action and we encourage protesting injustices. This year our letter writing campaigns have been directed to hunger, gun violence, and now women's reproductive health. Members march in the Pride parade and protest on the steps of the Indiana Capitol building.

So yes, we are flukes – not the parasitic flukes or the bottom dwelling fish, rather those "unlikely occurrences". Or just maybe, we are NOT flukes, but just delphiniums thriving in the heavy clay of Indiana? Feel passionate about justice. Write, write often. Speak, speak often. We are here for a purpose. From our Constitution: "We believe in the freedom and responsibility of the individual soul, and the right of private judgment; wherefore no test of creed or dogma shall be required as a condition of membership." What I love about this church is that we don't have to share the same thoughts and beliefs in order to support one another. All we need is love and the belief that we can improve the lives of others.

All of our efforts, actions, communications, and fellowship rest on the mundane. It is hot, to be sure, and as in past summers we sometimes forget to give. Covid plays a part. But our church needs all of us to remember: give, give often, give generously -- even during the hot doldrums of summer. I'll see you in church – wearing a mask and my name tag too!

WISE Mental Health Team Report



They are on a special Mental Health designated shelf on the rolling cart in the Southwest corner of the library on the second floor of the church. Come check out the new books and take one out to read!

As some of you may have heard there is a new mental health related emergency number in the U. S. It is 988 and will connect callers or texters directly to mental health services they need rather than sending police and ambulances to the location of a mental health crisis when that type of care is not optimal for the person experiencing the crisis. It should be easier for people to remember than the national crisis line- 1-800-273-TALK (8255) though that number will still be operational.

Highlights:

- **Income** of \$130,000 was \$7,400 below budget due primarily to lower-than-budgeted contributions.
- **Expenses** of \$136,900 were \$2,800 below budget. Savings in Worship and Faith (mostly lower music expenses) and Outreach and Service (mostly timing-related) were partially offset by higher-than-budget Administrative Operations expenses.
